



# Division Commanders

## Operations Division

The Operations Division is the largest division and is led by Captain Rob Worley. The Division is responsible for many vital components such as Uniform Patrol, the K-9 Unit, the Reserve Unit, the Police Cadets, Fleet Operations, Community Outreach, and Special Events.

## Support Division

The Support Division is led by Captain Scott Bennett and is responsible for many of the day-to-day administrative duties. The Division manages Criminal Investigations, Emergency Management, Background & Recruitment, Internal Affairs, Public Information Officer, the assigned Task Force Officer, Records, Communications, and State Certification.

## Special Operations Division



# 2022 Crime Statistics



The Lilburn Police Department compiles crime statistics monthly and participates in the following programs.

## National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS)

The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) captures details on each single crime incident. The details are published and are used to find patterns and take preemptive action against future crime. NIBRS data is shared, as needed, to assist in the detection of violent criminal activities and trends internationally.

## Hate Crime Statistics

The Hate Crime Statistics Data Collection provides information on crimes motivated by offenders' bias against race, gender, gender identity, religion, disability, sexual orientation, and ethnicity. This information allows communities and law enforcement to fully understand the scope of the problem in a community and put resources toward preventing and addressing attacks on bias and hate.

## Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA)

The Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA) Data Collection offers information about officers who were feloniously or accidentally killed or assaulted while performing their duties. The information is published and used to help agencies develop policies to improve officer safety.

## The National Use of Force Data Collection

The National Use of Force Data Collection provides for transparency, accountability, and trust. Data users can view use-of-force incidents involving law enforcement from a nationwide perspective and provide an aggregate view of the incidents reported and the circumstances, subjects, and officers involved.

## Law Enforcement Suicide Data Collection

The Law Enforcement Suicide Data Collection aims to help agencies better understand and prevent suicides among current and former law enforcement officers, corrections employees, 911 operators, judges, and prosecutors.



Uniform Patrol Officers are assigned to the three zones in the city. Officers work 12-hour shifts to cover each zone. Assignments to zones assisted officers in being familiar with the residents and businesses providing proactive policing in each zone. Out of the 24,220 calls for service officers responded to in 2022, only 5 interactions with the public resulted in any need for use of force.



Uniform Patrol Officers continue to use cutting edge technology. All officers are equipped with body worn cameras and all patrol vehicles are equipped with dash cam video recorders. Videos assist in prosecuting crimes and can be used as a training tool.



The Rapid ID Mobile Fingerprint scanner provides officers assistance in the positive identification of suspects. The device is an efficient tool that can be used in the field that saves officers time and can accurately identify persons of interest.

All officers are trained to use Narcan, a single use nasal spray used to rapidly reverse an opioid overdose. All officers also carry tourniquets to stop bleeding. This equipment assists Gwinnett EMS to provide life saving measures.



# Traffic Unit

The responsibility for the enforcement of traffic laws and regulations rests with all uniformed personnel in the department. A traffic unit was formed to concentrate on traffic enforcement and accident investigations.

Of the 1,201 accidents worked in 2022, 268 accidents had reported injuries. This is a .03% decrease in accidents from the previous year.

The top five contributing factors at accident scenes:

- >Following too close
- >Failure to Yield
- >Changed Lanes Improperly
- >Too Fast for Conditions
- >Driver Lost Control



The Accident Investigation Unit worked one fatality accident in the city limits and also assisted other agencies working fatality accidents.

All Traffic Units are equipped with an Automatic License Plate Reader (ALPR) to assist officers in identifying persons or vehicles who are connected to a crime.



In 2022, the department issued 6,455 citations that were processed by the Courts. This is a .08% increase from the previous year. Officers continue to issue warning citations as a tool to proactively prevent accidents.



# Canine Unit

The Lilburn Police Department Canine Unit was established in 2017. Sgt. Almedin "AJ" Ajanovic is assigned as the K-9 handler. Our canine, Ajax, is a Belgium Malinois.

In 2022, Sgt. Ajanovic and Ajax attended over 167 hours of training, to include Handler Education/ Classroom Training and direct training hours with Ajax. The unit made approximately 100 citizen contacts during the year.

The Canine Unit conducted 27 deployments during 2022 - 13 Patrol Deployments (Tracks, Articles, Area Search) and 14 Detection Deployments (Narcotics).

The Unit made 8 arrests to include 4 located/apprehended persons and 4 narcotics arrests. The unit seized 1.318 kilograms of marijuana, 10 items containing THC and 4 grams of cocaine. In addition, the unit seized \$3,400 in currency and 1 vehicle.



The Canine Unit earned **1st place** in the 2022 Patrol Dog Team at the Seminar in Kentucky.



The Lilburn Police Department K-9 Unit has obtained certification with the National Narcotic Detector Dog Association (NNDDA) and the American Working Dog (AWD) Narcotics and Patrol.

# Special Response Team



The Special Response Team (SRT) consists of officers who are trained and equipped to meet the unique challenges of high-risk operations.



The Multi-Jurisdictional Special Response Team (SRT) served 16 high risk warrants in 2022. Many of the warrants were service for the Gwinnett Metro Task Force involving the sale of narcotics, to include methamphetamine, fentanyl, and illegal prescription drugs. The SRT also served an armed robbery and aggravated assault warrant, as well as, burglaries, entering auto with firearms thefts, and multiple sexual exploitation of children warrants. During the execution of many of these warrant service several handguns were located, including recovery of stolen guns. These warrants are a combination of cases from Lilburn, Duluth, and Suwanee.



# Criminal Investigations



In 2022, there were 3 investigators assigned to the Criminal Investigations Unit that report to Lieutenant Keith Boles. Investigators made 16 arrests and issued warrants in 20 cases clearing major cases. The Criminal Investigations Unit had a 25% clearance rate of cases assigned.

In addition to the 3 investigators, an investigator is also assigned to the Gwinnett Metro Task Force (GMTF). In 2022 the Task Force conducted many organized crime and major narcotics investigations.



The Lilburn Police Department, as part of the Georgia Bureau of Investigation Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, continues to investigate crimes of possession of child pornography and child sexual assault.

## 2022 Highlights



In February 2022, Investigator Vince Difatta was selected as the Law Enforcement Officer of the Quarter by the Gwinnett County District Attorney's Office.

>Religious facilities (mostly Temples) around the country were being targeted by a group looking for money and jewelry. Working with multiple agencies, including the FBI, investigators were able to identify and issue warrants on an individual.

>An aggravated assault occurred at a local business. A man that was beating a woman in a parking lot shot at a patron of the business that tried to interfere. The suspect fled the scene. After an thorough investigation, the suspect was identified and arrested.

>A female was identified and arrested for several shoplifting cases that occurred at a local bottle shop.

>A Lilburn robbery case was cleared by arrest, along with other Gwinnett robbery cases, due to investigators diligence in identifying the perpetrator.

>Two Internet Crimes Against Children arrests were made. A digital forensic search was completed in one case that resulted in an estimated 200,000 images located. This was the largest amount of child sexual abuse material seen by one investigator in years.

>After numerous catalytic converter thefts, an arrest was made.

>Warrants were issued for a suspect that was stealing air conditioning units from construction sites.

>After an investigation, warrants were issued for a suspect for entering a woman's car while she was pumping gas and stealing money.



Maxwell High School of Technology students created a special tool for the multi-jurisdictional response team at the request of Maxwell alumnus and Lilburn Police Investigator Cody Belcher. The students used 3D printers to create camera mounts to helmets. The specialty mounted cameras is a huge upgrade to the team that regularly serves warrants to dangerous or violent suspects.

# Training Unit

In 2022, Lilburn Police officers attained 3,802 hours of Peace Officers Standards & Council approved training hours. Training was held at a Georgia Police Academy, in-service classroom training at the department, or during roll call. Training for all employees is maintained by Sgt. Seung Suk.

# Code Enforcement


The City of Lilburn Code Enforcement Unit currently employs one full-time officer and one part-time officer. These code enforcement officers report to Special Operations under the direction of Captain Chris Dusik.

The process of code enforcement protects the health, safety, welfare, and property values of Lilburn residents. This process has been developed, not only to furnish the city a means to obtain code compliance, but to protect the rights of anyone identified as being in violation of a city code.

The most common residential code enforcement complaint is exterior trash and debris. An example would be junk items placed outside such as appliances, tires, and trash. In 2022, Code Enforcement officers have also handled calls related to tall grass, sign violations, vehicles parked on the grass or in commercial zones, junk vehicles, illegal construction, unsafe structures, and water pollution. It is the goal of the Code Enforcement unit to gain voluntary compliance by meeting with the violator and educating the public.

# ADMINISTRATION & RECORDS

The Senior Administrative Assistant to the Chief of Police, Monica Sims, maintains all confidential files, complies with open record requests, accepts and processes court subpoenas, assists in coordinating activities, and keeps up with the budget and grants. These are only a few of the duties the Assistant is responsible for to aid in the operations of the department.



## SUPPORT



**Veleta Bogar received the President's Award from the Georgia Poice Accreditation Coalition in June of 2022.**



**Monica Sims was awarded "Assistant of the Year" by the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police in 2022.**

The Records Section is under the Support Division and led by Support Services Manager Veleta Bogar. Senior Records Clerk Robin Berta-Miller and Records Clerk Rhonda Davis process citations, accident reports, and case reports. They also handle all open records requests and maintain all stolen vehicle, gun, and property entries and wanted person entries in the GCIC computer. In 2022, the section maintained 924 warrant entries.

The Records Section serves the public by providing background checks and fingerprinting services. The section processed 1,125 background checks in 2022. The section also managed 788 false alarm billings and assisted in crime analysis and permits.

# Ongoing Programs

## Citizen Police Academy



The Citizen Police Academy is a 13-week program designed to educate and inform citizens about issues that face law enforcement efforts in the City of Lilburn. Topics include crime prevention and community based policing, drugs, K9, traffic enforcement and accident investigations, criminal investigations, the Use of Force Model and use of force training, firearms safety and the law, as well as a tour of the Gwinnett County Jail.

## Women's Self-Defense

The Women's Self-Defense Program is a two-day comprehensive course that begins with classroom instruction in risk awareness, risk reduction, crime prevention strategies and defensive concepts followed by hands-on-training in physical defense techniques. Class instruction and demonstrations will allow the participants to decrease their vulnerability and give a new sense of confidence and personal power.



## Public Safety Cadet Youth Program



The Police Cadet Program is a work-site based program for young men and women who have completed the 8th grade and are between 14 and 21 years old. In general, police cadet programs provide knowledge, skills and abilities in a competitive training environment to help prepare participants to assume critical roles as public safety officers.

## Chaplains

The Lilburn Police Department Chaplains are Dr. Scott Batterton and Pastor David Cardoza. Chaplains attend training at the Georgia Association of Law Enforcement Chaplains (GALEC). The chaplains assist the Department by making death notifications, responding to hospitals when officers or their families are injured or ill, attending or participating in funerals involving personnel, responding to critical incidents and major disasters, and providing liason with other religious leaders in the community.



## Vulnerable Citizens Program

**Vulnerable Citizens Registry Program**

**About The Program**  
This voluntary registry will provide the Police Department with emergency contact information, detailed physical descriptions, known routines and special needs of individuals who reside within the city. This information will assist officers in communicating with, attending a residence of, or dealing with an emergency involving this individual.

**Eligibility**  
While there is not an exhaustive list, this registry is designed for residents in Lilburn who are at risk if separated from their caregiver such as residents with Alzheimer's Disease, Dementia, Autism, Down's syndrome or similar disabilities.

The flyer includes images of an elderly couple, a child with colorful gloves, and a person in a wheelchair.

The Vulnerable Citizen's Registry is a community based policing initiative by the Lilburn Police Department. The registry promotes communication between vulnerable persons, the people who support them, and the police. This information will assist officers when responding to an emergency involving the vulnerable individual. The registry provides quick access to critical information about a registered person, such as who to call in an emergency, a detailed physical description, and any particular sensitivities that the person may experience. Registration is completely voluntary and is kept confidential and only used "in-house" by Lilburn Officers. ## State Certification

The State Certification program through the Georgia Association Chiefs of Police acknowledges the implementation of procedures conceptually sound and operationally effective. Lilburn Police Department policies and procedures are reviewed and revised, as needed, and the department continues to maintain compliance with all standards.



# Community Outreach



**The Lilburn Police Department's Community Outreach program is managed by Corporal Mike Johnson. It was an incredible year in 2022 with many notable achievements.**

**Many of these accomplishments were new programs that were started regarding crime trends and the needs of the citizens throughout the city. The results have been very positive brought the Lilburn Police Department closer to the citizens it serves and keeping citizens safer.**



**The Lilburn Police Department held 85 safety presentations throughout the city and parts of Gwinnett County. These presentations included neighborhood watch meetings, safety presentations at houses of worship, active shooter presentations for churches, schools, and businesses, senior scam presentations, and career days for public schools. The Lilburn Police Department also hosted two Scouts of America tours and hosted a Scout Workshop for a scout troop to achieve a forensics badge. These presentations are vital to keeping citizens informed of crime trends, the importance of reporting suspicious activity, and providing valuable information on how to stay protected.**


**The Lilburn Police Department held or attended several annual events to include, National Night Out at the Lilburn City Park, the Gwinnett County Multi-Cultural Festival, the Gwinnett County Safety Festival at 12 Stone Church, the Georgia Gwinnett College Safety Festival, Law Enforcement Appreciation High at Mill Creek High School, the Annual Shop With a Cop program, the annual DEA National Takeback Program turning in prescription drugs for safe disposal, and the Faith and Blue event held at the Lilburn Police Department that included a community blood drive.**

# Community Outreach



The Lilburn Police Department used several social media platforms to expand community outreach. A monthly article is published called "The Safety Zone," addressing current crime trends or relevant issues to the time of year. The LPD in collaboration with Gwinnett County PD, presented "Gun Safety in the Household" that was sponsored by Georgia State Representative Jasmine Clark and Fox 5 Atlanta.

Community Outreach was invited to a hispanic radio station to explain how the City of Lilburn serves its citizens. The program was also set in podcasts.



The Department was featured in the Gwinnett magazine "Our Town." The article highlighted the citizens police academy and all the positive benefits for the attendees.
