

New playground opens at Lilburn City Park

Several children in attendance on Saturday, April 13 had the honor of cutting the red ribbon to open the new playground at Lilburn City Park! People gathered with excitement to be the first to enjoy the new playground and they weren't disappointed.

The renovated playground includes separate play areas for younger and older children, brand new equipment, a softer playing surface, and better wheelchair accessibility. The new Landscape Structures Inc. equipment provides linear arches, webbing, interactive panels, and climbers that invite creative routing without a designated entry or exit point. Multiple ground level activities and a padded artificial playground grass provide for improved accessibility. The structures, which reflect the colors of the city's logo, offer greater visibility across the playground and a more artistic element compared to traditional posts, platforms, and bars.

The two main structures are designed for specific age groups (2-5+ years and 6-12+ years) according to developmental abilities. Each includes a slide and multiple mental and physical challenges with climbing, balancing, pulling, spinning, bouncing, and jumping opportunities. The large Lunar Burst structure located in the center of the playground allows children to climb up, down, in, and around in any direction and enjoy a birds eye view of Camp Creek and the park lawn. Swings at the playground were chosen to accommodate a variety of ages and abilities. In addition to traditional



lap and toddler swings, the playground features an Oodle and a Friendship Swing. These unique swings encourage different ages, parent-child, or friends to swing together. The playground also features several multi-purpose walls that provide seating, in addition to a visible and physical perimeter for the area.

The new playground was designed by

local landscape architect Lose Design and the equipment and turf were installed by Playground Creations. The playground was funded by the 2017-2023 SPLOST, the one-cent sales tax approved by voters. Avoid Hazards While Spring Cleaning

Springtime is officially here and with that comes spring cleaning! Many of us use this time of year to tidy things up around our homes and yards, or on our vehicles. While cleaning, we use many common household products that could contain potentially dangerous components. We must be mindful of the use and disposal of these products in order to prevent them from becoming household hazardous waste in our waterways.

You can identify household hazardous waste products quite easily. They include any product that is corrosive or toxic, as well as any item that is ignitable, reactive, or that poses an explosive risk. Some common examples of household hazardous waste products include paint, oil, pesticides, vehicle fluids, or even some light bulbs. Even common items like disinfecting wipes or bleach can become hazardous if they aren't properly disposed.

One way you can prevent your household products from becoming hazardous to the environment is by reading the disposal directions on the product label. Here are a few other suggestions to consider when dealing with HHW:

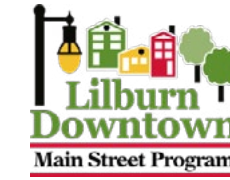
- Do not pour these products down a storm drain, into a waterway, or onto the ground
- Mix leftover paint with cat litter to help it solidify and toss it in the garbage
- Only buy the amount of product you need to complete your task
- Check with local retailers and their recycling programs to see if they will accept your home products for disposal

New park restrooms underway

Construction of the new restrooms at Lilburn City Park has begun. The 2,000+ square foot building is being constructed by BM&K Construction & Engineering. In addition to twenty-five stalls, the building will include two ADA compliant restrooms, two family restrooms, and a storage area.

"City events continue to grow in popularity and one of the most frequent comments I hear at events is the need for additional restrooms in the park," said City Manager Bill Johnsa. "This new building will better accommodate larger events and be a great addition for daily park users as well."

The city hosts a variety of events throughout the year including concerts, food truck nights, and parades. Two of the larger events are the city's annual July 4th celebration, Sparkle in the Park, and Lilburn Daze Arts and Crafts Festival, which takes place in October and is organized by the Lilburn Woman's Club. Sparkle in the Park brings 12,000+ people to Lilburn City Park and the downtown area. The 46th annual Lilburn Daze event is expected to draw 10,000 people to the park.

Construction of the building is expected to take four months. The new restroom facility is being funded by the 2017 SPLOST Recreation/Capital Projects Fund. Signs checked annually

Traffic signs contain small glass beads or prismatic reflectors that reflect light from vehicle headlamps, making the signs appear brighter and more visible to the driver. Each year the City of Lilburn Public Works Department tests the reflectivity of 1,600 traffic signs in the city with a device called a RoadVista 922 Retroreflectometer. Measuring the retroreflectivity and assessing the expected life of each sign helps ensure that they meet the requirements set forth by the Federal Highway Administration.
